Rabbinic Reflections

The Lessons We Learn from Purim

We all know that Purim is a very colourful and light hearted holiday distinguished by festive costumes, drinking, irreverent humour and tasty hamantaschen pastry. But if we pause for a moment to understand the significance of the holiday, then we quickly realize how profound are its themes and customs. The four characteristics of Purim are Megillah, Mishteh, Mishloach Manot, and Matanot L'Evvonim.

Reading the *Megillah* of Esther reminds us of the importance of sacred texts as a source of inspiration and guidance. *Mishteh* or feasting suggests that religion without joy is burdensome and will be jettisoned by young and old alike. *Mishloach Manot*, sending gifts to our friends, teaches the value of gratitude and that only mutually enriching relationships endure. Lastly, *Matanot L'Evyonim*, giving *tzedakah* to the poor, impresses upon us the obligation to help the needy and to thereby repair the imbalances in the world that cause suffering and despair.

With regard to the actual text of the Megillah, we glean three relevant messages for living in our complex world. The first is that Purim teaches us the value of treating women equally to men. Without Esther's intelligence and courage, the Jews of her time would not have survived. Esther is an example to maturing boys and girls (and to adults as well) that gender should not be a limitation to fulfilling one's potential. And, as the #METOO movement reminds us, we should teach our children the importance of respecting boundaries.

A second message from the Megillah is that it is vital that Jews rise up and fight for their own defense. While the Jews of Shushan stood alone against the attempted genocide against them, the alarming rise in anti-Semitism in North America and globally calls upon us, more now than ever, to create coalitions with other discriminated minorities in the struggle to eradicate hate and prejudice. Our fate is linked to the well-being of others whose safety and freedoms are under attack.

A corollary to building coalitions against hate is that we must also increase our religious literacy about what others believe and practice. Only through knowledge can we dispel the proliferation of prejudicial stereotypes and canards against Jews, Muslims, racial minorities, the

LGBTQ+ community, and others. As Jews, we must fight bias and intolerance regardless of who it targets and whenever it raises its ugly head. Our history has sensitized us to the tragic and irrational consequences of hatred. It is our duty to engage in the fight for human rights and dignity in our own community and throughout the world.

I encourage you to celebrate Purim as it is meant to be observed. Not as a holiday exclusively for children, but a time to joyously celebrate life, deepen our relationships to those we cherish, and to renew our effort as co-partners with God in the act of bringing *shalom* and *tikun olam* into the world.

Cantor's Notes



Following the destruction of our Temple in 70 CE, instrumental music and general joy making were greatly restricted in the worship of the synagogue. As Maimonides summed it up in his *Mishneh Torah*, "the Sages forbid the playing of musical instruments, and

the enjoyment of melody and song of any kind, on account of the destruction of the Temple." Not exactly an appealing recipe for making the synagogue a fun place to be. However, two times during the liturgical year these restrictions were lifted, Simchat Torah and Purim. Now when it comes to Purim, it seems obvious why we would do this. First, the lengthy *Megillah* reading and Purim atmosphere beg for a musical component. I mean, have you ever been to a really rockin' party that didn't have a great underlying beat? Second, and slightly more important, the music associated with Purim, and in particular the musical embellishments of the *Megillah* reading, help to overcome one of the most glaring problems with the holiday and with the Esther story itself, the seeming absence of God.

Due to some strong rabbinic objection, inclusion of the Book of Esther in the *TaNaKH* or Bible did not come easy, and once it was finally received into the cannon, great efforts were made to resolve this glaring omission of divinity. Rabbinic responses throughout the ages have ranged from the notion that God's presence was concealed because of Israel's neglect of Torah at that time, to the discovery of God's name hidden acrostically in the text. For example, the first letters of the phrase *Yavo Hamelekh V'Haman Hayom* (The King and Haman will come today), which is found in Chapter 5, verse 4, spells out the Tetragrammaton or Four Letter Name of God, YHVH.

Some *midrashic* interpretations which help to place the Divine inside the narrative have also found musical expressions within the *Megillah* text. *Midrash Esther* 2:11, for example, states that the vessels used at Ahasuerus' feast were taken from the Jerusalem Temple by Nebuchadnezzar in 586 BCE. As a result, at the mention of these vessels, the comical Esther cantillation is replaced by the mournful mode of *Eicha* or Lamentations, invoking the Ninth of Av, the day we

commemorate the Temple's destruction. Also, in Esther Chapter 6, verse 1, we are told of King Ahasuerus' sleepless night. According to *Midrash Esther* 10:1, it is stated that God, the King of kings, was likewise sleepless on this particular night on account of His people's terrible plight. In Ashkenazi custom, this sentence is therefore sung with the somber melody of *HaMelekh* (The King), used at the beginning of the morning service on Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, reminding the listeners of God's implicit presence in the text at that moment.

To my mind, such musical departures, aside from their sometimes tongue in cheek wittiness, provide a sacred context for the Esther scroll that can be more penetrating than even the most profound *midrashic* writings. With carefully inserted musical clues, recognizable to those *shul*-goers familiar with the melodies used throughout the year, the insights of the ancient Rabbis can come to life in a way that is just not possible through the written word alone. Through direct musical symbolism, there emerges an awareness of the Divine, central to the Rabbis' deep reading of the Esther text, which would not be possible without the allowance for musical humor and flexibility. In many ways, the joyous and lively presentation of the Esther scroll exemplifies the almost perfect marriage between music and the written word, and can be seen as the crowning example of what skillful religious music can bring to the worship experience.

So as you live it up this Purim, and I hope that you all will, keep your ears open. The music you hear may be solemn or silly, but the more you understand and participate in it, the more you will deeply understand Purim, both the ceremony and the shtick.
