Cantor's Notes



"Today is Purim, tomorrow it's gone – Give us a penny, and throw us out!"

The humble yet beloved *Purim spiel* ("play" in Yiddish) is the only genuine folk theater that has survived thousands of years of European culture, and still continues to flourish even up to the present day. In honour of the frivolity that will ensue later this month, as we commence our annual Purim celebrations, I would like to take you on a brief tour through the amazing history of this still beloved folk tradition.

Chazal (the Jewish sages from Mishnaic times through the period of the Talmud) condemned the theater as frivolous at best and vulgar/pagan at worst. This view was crystallized during the Roman Era, when live theatre was often cruel and violent and involved slaves, including Jews, as actors who were sometimes killed as part of the drama. Nevertheless, the rabbis faced a dilemma with the holiday of Purim. The story of Esther, which is based on disguise, farce, melodrama, comedy, and victory over existential threat, was a natural for theatrical re-enactment. Add to that the rejoicing, masquerade, irreverence, and even drunkenness that was quickly becoming part and parcel with the halachic laws and customs of the holiday, and you have an almost perfect storm, with public reenactments beginning sometime in the early centuries of the Common Era.

In most early Jewish communities the "re-enactment" was usually restricted to the hanging and burning of Haman in effigy, but in medieval Europe, surrounded by a larger cultural context of both Christian and secular folk entertainment, drama, carnival and parody, the idea of expanding the experience into a *spiel* began to quickly take root and flourish.

According to historian Chone Shmeruk the term *Purim spiel* started to appear throughout Ashkenazic Jewry as early as the mid-1500s. The *spiel* could be a poetic monologue, or a story portrayed by several actors. It was usually the story of Esther, but it also could be other biblical stories such as the selling of Joseph, Hannah and Samuel, or David and Goliath. Since most Jewish men were literate and traditionally educated, *midrash* and *aggadah* (stories told by

the sages which reflect or add to stories from the Torah) and rabbinic commentary were also incorporated, along with satire directed at the rabbi, cantor, community leaders, and other authorities. Secular stories were portrayed too, particularly derived from the characters of the Italian *commedia del arte*. Because of this secular influence, suggestive themes and language became increasingly popular elements. This led, at times, to the rabbinic establishment banning *spiels* outright. However, no matter how lewd or outrageous they became, the rabbis could never succeed in squelching the public's thirst for them.

Purim spiels were acted primarily by poor people like students, musicians, dancers, acrobats and artisans. They were performed either in large public venues like yeshivas, or for wealthy families, typically in their homes after the festive Purim meal. If the community was small, the actors took great pains to rehearse in secret and disguise themselves thoroughly so they would not be recognized, to their shame. They walked through the streets from house to house, followed by hordes of excited children, who would crowd into or hang from the windows of the homes of the rich, in order to see the performance. In these homes the actors were rewarded in the form of money and/or food. Afterward, they would eat together and dish their wealthy benefactors. All the roles were played by men and boys, the only day of the year when crossdressing was allowed, although a few women were known to have been acrobats and dancers in these elaborate productions.

When the *Haskalah* (the Jewish Enlightenment of the 18th and 19th centuries) reached Eastern Europe, a whole new genre of parodies for the *spiel* arose, written by the leaders of the *Haskalah* against the traditionalists and the Hasidim. One notorious example, directed at these new targets for satire, was the lyric, "And all our enemies call us treyf-eaters! But they are heretics, may they catch the plague!" included in many Yiddish *spiels* during this era.

The amateur folk quality of the *Purim spiel*, and its ability to be ever topical and irreverent, has guaranteed its survival in synagogues and schools to this day, and while *Purim spiels* may seem, on their surface, to diminish the spiritual importance of the holiday, they are part of an ongoing celebration of good over evil, and a festival which ultimately celebrates God's presence in Jewish history.

Through the President's Lens

A Message from David Inhaber

March is always a challenging month. We are quickly approaching the Beth Tzedec fiscal year end when the Board will commence the final deliberations on another annual budget. Our Vice President, Finance, along with our Executive Director, Clergy and staff are working tirelessly to determine what it will take to keep our budget balanced given the fixed costs of maintaining our building. We understand the importance of keeping our community fees stable with minimal or no increase, while at the same time we are also aware that our congregants are not able to accept out of control costs. Recognizing all the various components of the needs of the congregation, the aging building and continuing to provide all the services we have all become so accustomed to having at Beth Tzedec, we will be asking you to renew your commitment for 2020/2021.

We are grateful for both the financial support of our congregants and your personal participation in making Beth Tzedec the best it can be. Toward that end, I wanted to take the opportunity to thank you for filling out the surveys we distributed to everyone. Your voices were heard loud and clear. The response rate was high (over 100 completed surveys) and according to IPSOS was statistically accurate. The results are being tabulated and we will be providing an executive summary in a future edition of our Shofar.

Now we have moved on to open-sessions and targeted focus groups led by facilitators who are independent of our Executive and Board. It is important for congregants to know they can share any input without the feeling that they are being judged by our leadership team. If you have not already done so, there is still time to sign up and participate, watch for dates and times in Shalom Bytes and Lecha Dodi. Once again, we thank you for sharing your vision with us! We have been told by many of our guests, including Rabbis Sapirman and Klein, that we really do not do enough promotion of all the good things that happen at Beth Tzedec, which leads us to focus on our challenges, rather than celebrating our accomplishments.

We just had a number of amazing events at the Beth Tzedec, starting with the revival of Robbie Burnstein. Since its inception, Leonard Seidman has been the driving force and leader in bringing this spectacular evening to our Shul. This year we saw an affordable, intimate affair with friends and family and enjoyed quiet conversation, kibitzing and laughs throughout the night. This Robbie Burnstein brought us back to our roots, but don't take my word on just how amazing this event was, speak to the congregants and many guests who attended this year. We owe a special thank you and Yasher Koach to former Vice President Leonard Seidman who worked tirelessly to bring Burnstein back. In addition, a special thank you to Len's volunteers and especially our Beth Tzedec staff led by Max and his team in both the office and operations.

I was also privileged to witness a tot Shabbat, minyan and Kabbalat Shabbat in February. Over 50 attendees, young adults and families joined us for a brief service with Cantor Russ Jayne which was followed by a light dinner. During the course of my conversations with many of these young families I confirmed we are getting this right.

Hazak 55+ (not just for 55+ ... just so you know) was another well attended event. After listening to Cantor Jayne's continuing spiritual journey, we are yet again inspired by him to face the challenges in our own lives.

As you can see and as I have said before, our community commitment gives us access to many wonderful events and activities, but it is up to all of you, our congregants, to come and take advantage of these offerings.

Once again, I want to thank Cantor Russell Jayne and Executive Director Max Lipsman for their continuing professionalism and dedication to Beth Tzedec and our congregational family. We are also very grateful to all our congregants who have stepped up and davened, led parts of services, leyned Torah, accepted honours and volunteered to help us ensure a smooth transition of uninterrupted services while we continue our search for the third professional staff position. We want you to know that while this hire cannot happen overnight, the process is proceeding.

Finally, I want to share another amazing experience which took place on our Bimah in February. Cantor Jayne set aside his Shabbat sermon to allow a congregant to share her interpretation of Parchat Yitro. If you were lucky enough to attend, you know I'm speaking of Karry Taylor's D'var Torah, on Shabbat, Saturday, February 15.

Karry spoke about Moses just after the exodus from Egypt. She described how Moses spent his days as a judge amongst his people and how eventually, at the advice of his father-in-law, appointed a system of judges to ease the burden of being the sole judge. We learned the names of Moses' sons and for the first time we hear the term "strangers in a strange land". This theme of being a stranger in a strange land underlies much of Parshat Yitro. Pushing aside any discomfort or awkwardness about his outsider status, his father-in-law, Jethro, shares his insight, wisdom, and suggestions with Moses. While Moses, to his credit, allows himself to be open to an outsider's observation, and accepts the advice.

What brought this home to me was that we must remind ourselves that we have all had occasion to feel as strangers in a strange land.

Karry continued by telling us, "Being a stranger is something that we all must wrestle with both outside and within the Jewish community. At one point or another, each one of us has likely experienced a situation of feeling uncomfortable in a place where we should ostensibly feel comfort.

When we visit or walk into a new synagogue or another Jewish space that is unfamiliar to us, we immediately undertake the role of a stranger. Even though, in theory, every synagogue should be an open and welcoming place for everybody, in practice, one often can't escape that initial discomfort of feeling out of place.

Even within our own community and our own synagogue, we can experience a sense of discomfort. We might be new to the community and don't really know anybody yet. Or we might be longstanding members who aren't quite sure how or where to get more involved. Or we might be someone who has become a Jew by choice and, having converted and not having any Jewish family, spends important holidays alone.

There are many other reasons we might feel disconnected — even in a place we call home like the Beth Tzedec sanctuary. The key is how we respond to that feeling. We can choose to stay away. Or, my hope is, we can choose to be involved and to work towards finding ways to connect with others and with God to strengthen our community as a whole."

This D'var really spoke to me, and if you were there, likely it spoke to you as well. I was that guest who came to Calgary in 1981 and visited the Sharrey Tzedec and Beth Israel for the first time and I was the one who felt awkward and discomforted. My takeaway is to always be more mindful of those guests who enter our Beth Tzedec home and ensure we are as welcoming and inclusive as the members of Sharrey Tzedec and Beth Israel were to me many years ago. When I entered Sharrey Tzedec and Beth Israel, it was not the President of those congregations who made me feel welcome, it was the members like all of you.

We never really know how special and talented our congregants are until we get to know them. A very special thank you to Karry Taylor who reminded us that we all have a role to play at the Beth Tzedec Congregation.

I am continuing to feature the wonderful lay leaders who lead the services for our minyanim. I was curious to know how long they had been leading the davening, how they learned to lead and what their earliest memories of shul are.

Markham is the next davener in this series. He typically davens on the first Tuesday of the month, when he attends with his team the Silver

Maccabees or when he is coming to say Kaddish, but also when he has the chance to attend in the afternoons. Before and after services, he always has great stories to tell. Currently, he is 'on leave' as he works on taking care of his health.

I recently emailed Markham to ask him my questions.

Me: How long have you been leading the davening?

Markham: Probably since I was nine or 10 years old.

Me: How did you learn to daven?

Markham: I went to a parochial school in Toronto, Associated Hebrew School. We were taught how to lead services as part of the Hebrew school portion. And



we were "encouraged" to attend Junior Congregation at the school on Shabbat morning. On a rotational basis, we were given portions of the service to lead. Also, as I got older, after bar mitzvah, we were encouraged to attend morning services at least once a month. I was taught how to read Torah, haftorah, Megilat Esther and Eicha as part of my bar mitzvah learning as well as how to blow the shofar.

Me: What is your earliest memory of synagogue?

Markham: I remember being in grade one (age five) and being taken into the synagogue chapel of the school. This was a cross between a sanctuary and an actual chapel. It was not used for junior congregation, because that was held in the school gym. The Chapel was for a kehillah that was based out of the school. It was a beautiful chapel, even though the school building itself was pretty ugly. I also have a memory of being with my father at High Holiday services from the time I was 6 – which corresponded with my tonsillectomy, so I actually do remember it vividly.

Me: Thanks, Markham.

Wow, now I can understand why Markham is so knowledgeable about so many aspects of Judaism. He really had quite the bar mitzvah education and such good foundational learning. No wonder he is always so confident and capable.

We wish our friend Markham a refual shlema and we hope to see him attending services again soon with renewed strength and a clean bill of health. We miss you, Markham!

Ellie attends the Calgary Jewish Academy and is currently in grade seven. Ellie has been blessed with many wonderful friends.


