Cantor's Notes



Sharing of ourselves and our bounty is not a disposition that comes naturally to humanity.

It is precisely this innate aversion to deny ourselves that prompts the Torah to legislate a series of charitable acts that are quite unnatural, slightly utopian and utterly unenforceable. At harvest time the Torah enjoins us to share the land's bounty with the poor and the stranger in our midst. We should not cut the edges of our fields, or pick our vineyards bare and the gleanings of both are to be left lying where they fall. In all, they constitute four separate injunctions inspired by compassion, not to take wholly for ourselves what is rightfully ours, indeed, what we have painstakingly labored to produce by the sweat of our own brows.

The nobility of this speaks for itself. At the peak of our possessiveness, we are asked to settle for a little less and the beneficiaries of our largesse are spared the loss of their dignity and anonymity. The well-to-do have a responsibility to assist the vulnerable because no society can long endure if the gap between rich and poor runs amok. Therefore, to address that injustice, the Torah institutionalizes the exercise of good deeds and we are primed to perform them because of the deprivation endured by our ancestors in Egypt. Suffering has endowed us with a capacity to identify with the fate of the widow, the orphan and the stranger. Our humanity, in fact our very Jewishness itself, springs from a keen awareness of what it means to be inhuman.

The *Book of Ruth*, the second of the Tanakh's five scrolls to be read on Shavuot, turns on at least one of these mandated forms of charity. Both Ruth and Naomi, her mother-in-law, have returned to Israel from Moab widowed and forlorn. To provide some food for their bare table, Ruth announces, "I would like to go to the fields and glean among the ears of grain, behind someone who may show me kindness." She alights on the fields of Boaz, a relative of her deceased father-in-law, who is apprised of the selfless devotion that Ruth has shown to Naomi in abandoning her native land of Moab and attaching herself to Naomi's people and God. This goodness inspires Boaz not only to shower her with grain, but to also take her as his wife in accordance with the regulations of a levirate marriage. The ultimate reward of these decent people is that their child became the grandfather of none other than King David himself.

To read the heartwarming story of Ruth on Shavuot, which commemorates the giving of the Torah at Sinai, is to see a dramatic instance of God's revelation in action. Beyond that, the gentle lesson of Ruth is that decency can soften emptiness with purpose. By aiding others, we improve the quality not only of their lives but of ours as well. To be holy means to do with less for ourselves so that those in need might have a bit more. What is surprising about this story is that similar to the scroll of Esther, God's presence in Ruth recedes into the background. In this story good people become God's agents, who by doing what might not come naturally to most of us, turn the divine word into a tangible human reality. May we never forget that lesson, especially during this unique time, when we are all called upon to make God's presence palpable for others through even the smallest of deeds.

Through the President's Lens

A Message from David Inhaber

I hope you enjoyed meaningful Seders this year. One thing is for certain – this Passover was different than all other Passovers due to the 11th plague of COVID-19. Many of us had our Seders over the internet enjoying each other's company through computer screens, phones and other electronic media.

Some congregants included friends and family members for the first time by way of electronics. Our eyes were opened wide to the exciting possibilities when distance is no longer a barrier to sharing a Seder, a dinner or any family event when we can't physically be in the same location.

COVID-19 remains a sinister force around the globe, but there have been a few silver linings. While we had discussed the possibility of live streaming Shabbat and Holiday services prior to the pandemic, the immediate need to continue connecting with congregants caused us to take the technological leap with the blessings of our Conservative movement and the Rabbinical Assembly. We now have the means and the will to incorporate live stream services and Zoom Minyanim and classes, as appropriate, in future Shul programming.

We should all take great pride in the ways Beth Tzedec is adjusting to the changes caused by the pandemic. Within approximately one week of our shut-down we were providing daily Minyanim, classes and meetings via ZOOM and live streaming our Shabbat and festival services.

Our Kol-Bo, Cantor Russ, has done an amazing job of making virtual services warm and intimate. You won't want to miss his weekly Divrei Torah that are so meaningfully linked to current issues and events.

Yasher koach to Cantor Jayne and to our Executive Director, Max Lipsman, and his staff, for providing the support to make our transition to online platforms seamless and swift.

Shul School, Keruv classes and Hazak 55+ programs are now operating by distance and Cantor Russ is working on additional programming to feed the soul during this time of isolation.

Stay tuned to this and future issues of *Shofar* and our weekly e-newsletter *Shalom Byte* for details on upcoming services and programs.

We have reached out to as many congregants as possible offering spiritual help and assistance when needed. Members of our lay leadership team have completed two sets of phone calls to congregants. If our volunteers somehow missed you or you know of a congregant who could benefit from a phone call or other assistance, please let us know.

As we all continue to navigate the COVID-19 shutdown and what is expected to be a protracted period of physical distancing, we have come to the realization that our plan for a face-to-face Annual General Meeting is no longer realistic.

In light of the advice of Alberta Health Services and legal counsel, as well as our own By-Law requirements, we will be postponing the AGM until after the High Holidays. To keep our congregants up-to-date with important information concerning Synagogue operations and finances, we will provide a live streamed business update on June 17. We will make this meeting as interactive as possible by encouraging congregants to submit questions in advance or online during the business update.

The months of April and May are important ones on the Beth Tzedec Calendar. This is when our Management Team ramps up our planning for the High Holidays. As you can well imagine, this year is particularly challenging because, for the first time in Beth Tzedec history, we must plan for multiple alternatives due to the health emergency. Two things are certain: We will provide main sanctuary services and the family-friendly alternative service. While we pray that we will be able to come together in person, we will use all the tools at our disposal to provide outstanding virtual services if Alberta Health continues to restrict large gatherings.

We remain active in the Conservative movement, ensuring that Beth Tzedec honours the values, tenets and practices of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. A major benefit of that affiliation is the opportunity to learn from the best practices of similar Shuls and communities throughout North America and around the world and to share our own successes. This has been especially helpful in recent days and weeks.

Maintaining traditions while at the same time embracing change is exciting and creative work. In that spirit, your Board is building a model for our future that honours the past while inviting congregants to take part in Jewish experiences that are relevant and consistent with your way of life.

Another important April/May activity is the renewal of your commitment to the Beth Tzedec family. Your annual statement will be delivered shortly. Given the sustained economic downturn in our province and the additional financial pressure felt by many of our congregants due to COVID-19, we will be issuing statements at the same rates as last year.

The Synagogue Board and staff have been strategically working on reductions in fixed and variable costs while dedicating considerable effort toward the building of endowment funds. On behalf of the entire congregation we thank those individuals and families who support the Synagogue through generous endowment gifts that will help to sustain Beth Tzedec for generations to come.

Our Synagogue's active participation in the Life & Legacy program over the past 14 months has led to more than 25 promises of after lifetime gifts. Thanks to the generosity of congregants and friends in the greater community, we hope this number will continue to grow. As these endowment funds multiply, we look forward to the time when we can reduce the congregation's reliance on annual commitments.

For now, Beth Tzedec continues to rely upon your annual financial commitment. Thanks, in advance, for your continued and timely support and your participation in Synagogue life.

Though our daily services have been suspended during this extraordinary time, I am continuing to feature the wonderful lay leaders who lead the services for our Minyanim. I was curious to know how long they had been leading the davening, how they learned to lead and what their earliest memories of shul are.

The series continues with Lorie Abernethy.

Perhaps you have been lucky enough to hear Lorie as she davens the P'seukei D'Zimre on select Shabbat mornings. Or maybe you have been present during an evening when she is leading the daily Minyan service. I really enjoy listening to Lorie when she leads. Her voice is soothing and very easy to listen to. I also loved the speeches that she made when addressing our youth at their B'nei Mitzvah as Sisterhood chair. I learned so much about the weekly parshot through them. I recently emailed Lorie to ask her my questions.



Me: How long have you been leading the davening?

Lorie: I have been leading services since 2006 when I decided it was time that a woman lead P'seukei D'Zimra as part of the annual Sisterhood Shabbat services. So, I took it upon myself to learn it. We had recently become egalitarian and I wanted to step up and do my part.

I have learned all parts of the service since then.

Me: How did you learn to daven?

Lorie: I first learned to daven from Rabbi Moshe Saks – he helped me with the P'seukei. I had Sahbra Markus tutor me 1:1 to get the Hebrew correct. I then learned more through Women's League and our Sisterhood, learning how to lead the daily morning services and to put on tefillin. I lead more services through Women's League at regional and international conferences. Then I attended an Imun program, that was recommended by Maxine which really helped with trope and got me

introduced to Trope Trainer. Marc Levin lead fabulous Hebrew classes that helped immensely. And Rabbi Ofseyer, and Cantor Russ have been mentors as I have developed my skills. It has been a long journey filled with nothing but joy.

Me: What is your earliest memory of synagogue?


