Finding Faith in the Wilderness

The wildernesses in which we may find ourselves are not seen only as places of danger or confusion. They are also where profound transformation happens.

The Torah portions that are generally read during the early summer months often come from the Book of Numbers, known in Hebrew as *Bamidbar* or “In the Wilderness.” It is a fitting title for the fourth book of our Torah, because much of the story in this book unfolds not in moments of stability or triumph, but in the uncertain spaces that occur as we travel between them.

As *Sefer Bamidbar* opens, our ancestors are getting ready to leave Mount Sinai and begin their journey toward the Promised Land. They are no longer enslaved, but they are not yet settled. They are living in a moment of great transition, travelling through an unfamiliar terrain and carrying with them both hope and anxiety.

In many ways, the wilderness described in this section of our story is one of the Torah’s most relatable landscapes. This is because most of us know what it feels like to live “between destinations.” We experience many moments in life when we have to leave behind something familiar but do not yet know what is coming next. Graduates entering a new chapter of life and learning; families facing uncertainties about health, work, or relationships; communities trying to discern their future in a rapidly changing world.

The wilderness is not just a place; it

is an experience.

And yet, one of the most remarkable overarching themes in *Sefer Bamidbar* is that the wildernesses in which we may find ourselves are not seen only as places of danger or confusion. They are also where profound transformation happens. They are where we truly learn how to be a people. They are where we receive guidance, build community, confront our fears, and discover a resilience that we may not have even known we could have possessed.

Again and again, our ancestors struggled in the wilderness. They complain. They lose patience. They long for certainty. At times, they even romanticize the familiarity of Egypt rather than face the ambiguity of freedom. Our Torah does not idealize them and what they are experiencing. Quite the opposite. Our Torah uses their struggles to teach us the enduring truths that growth is difficult, transition can be disorienting, and having faith does not mean that uncertainty is erased.


For me, there is something deeply comforting about a message that acknowledges that much of life is lived in waiting, in searching, in adapting, and in continuing forward one step at a time. Yet, these moments are not empty or meaningless. They are often where

some of the most important growth occurs.

As we move into the summer season, may we find the courage to continue our journeys with patience and hope. May we support one

another through the transitions we may be facing , and may we remember that even in moments when the destination is unclear, we are still capable of moving forward with purpose, resilience, and faith.

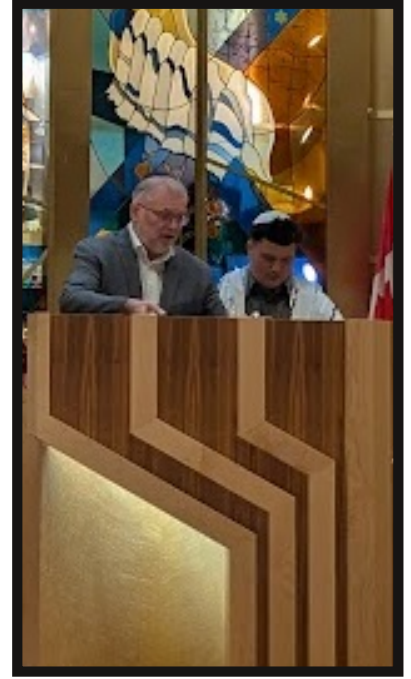

Volunteer Spotlight: Lorne Pearl

For twenty years, Lorne Pearl has been a dedicated presence at Beth Tzedec, helping to shape and strengthen the community through leadership, service, and connection. From helping to build the synagogue's very first website to serving as President and supporting countless programs and services, Lorne's volunteer journey reflects a deep commitment to building meaningful relationships and sustaining a vibrant kehillah for generations to come.

How long have you been involved with Beth Tzedec? For twenty years.

What brought you to our congregation? I moved here from Ottawa for a job. I grew up in the Conservative shul there, Agudath Israel, and I wanted to connect with the Jewish community in Calgary and the local shul. I went looking for the website for Beth Tzedec and there wasn't one, so when I arrived, I started attending and offered to create a website. From there my connection with Beth Tzedec grew.

What roles or volunteer activities have you taken part in over the years? Over the years, I've been a Board member, Vice President of the Ritual Committee, and President of the shul.

What do you enjoy most about volunteering at Beth Tzedec? Connecting with people. I've made so many friends through Beth Tzedec and volunteering, and those relationships are the best part of being part of the community.

Is there a particular project, event or moment that stands out to you? Being involved in the planning for High Holiday services, I always get a special feeling during the Havdalah at the end of Yom Kippur when we turn

the lights off, the Ark is lit, and we sing the brachot together, followed by the shofar blast with the kids on the bimah.

What's something people might not realize about the work you do?

It takes time to learn enough about the community, the people, the history of the synagogue to make decisions about its future. But at the same time, it's easy and fun to jump in and help out at a single program, to see what it's like and to meet new people.

What do you do outside of synagogue life? I'm an IT professional who loves to watch sports, especially hockey and the Ottawa Senators. I'm happily married to my lovely wife, and we love to travel together.

Do you have a favourite Jewish holiday, tradition, or memory connected to Beth Tzedec? I really enjoy the B'nai Mitzvot of those in the Keruv class. They've worked so hard to join our community, and taking the next step of having a Bar or Bat



Mitzvah shows a true comfort with and commitment to our *kehillah*. It makes me feel so happy for them.

What does being part of this kehillah mean to you? Connection, community, friendships, responsibility, the opportunity to share joy and support sorrows.

Coffee or tea? Neither. For a hot drink, it's hot chocolate, but even that is rare.

Bagels or babka? A toasted everything bagel with lots of butter.

What's something that always makes you smile? Someone else's smile.
